Ella Casano has always hated the IV treatments she needs to help control her immune disorder, so she came up with an invention to turn something scary into a reason to smile for thousands of kids!

ringing, 7-year-old Ella Casano gazed at the needle piercing her skin, her eyes tracing the long, skinny tube snaking up to an IV bag filled with medication hanging on a pole. Having just been diagnosed with an immune disorder, Ella underwent infusions every eight weeks. And at every treatment, she couldn't stop looking up at the bag with a knot in her belly. All that medicine is going *inside of me?* she worried. And looking around at the other children, she saw the same anxious expression on their faces.

By fifth grade, Ella had become a pro at getting infusions, yet she still cringed at the sight of the IV bag. So when a class assignment required students to come up with an invention to solve a problem unique to



them, Ella immediately got an idea: "I want to design a way to hide a scary IV bag with something more friendly looking," Ella exclaimed to her parents.

After brainstorming, Ella got a stuffed animal from her room, cut it open and removed the stuffing. A nurse, her mom had the feeling Ella was on to something, so she ordered an IV pole and bag and some mesh. After some experimentation, the first "Medi Teddy" was born.

The smiling teddy bear fits over IV and feeding tube bags, to conceal the contents from the patient, but it has a see-through mesh back so doctors and nurses can monitor the fluid in the bag. Feeling proud, Ella entered her Medi Teddy in the Connecticut Invention Convention, where it was so well-received that she advanced to the regional and state level of the competition.

"I want to turn this into a real business so I can help other kids like me," Ella announced.

Over the next couple of years, with her mom's help, Ella got a patent and established her business as a not-for-profit

organization (Medi-Teddy.org). And after raising \$24,000 with a GoFundMe, she began shipping Medi Teddys to kids, foundations and hospitals.

Soon, joyful messages began rolling in. One grateful mom wrote: I just wanted to say how amazing you are! My son is 13 and has to have IVs. Seeing all those IVs is scary for me, so it's got to be worse for a child. I just wanted to tell you "well done" for helping all those kids while dealing with illness yourself. Another shared: Medi Teddy helps provide a little comfort—that's so important!

Today, Ella, now 13, has donated more than 1,000 bears, easing the fears of as many kids. And her own Medi Teddy, named Baily, still provides comfort when she goes for her infusions. "I have a favorite saying," Ella smiles. "It says, 'She believed she could, so she did.' I'd love to encourage others to turn a struggle into a blessing for someone else. It makes *you* feel better!" —*Diane Nichols*
